

### **NEEDS ASSESSMENT AND TARGETING**

## Refugee Situation and National Society Priorities Estonia





### Humanitarian impact of the crisis and resulting needs

As of January 2023, approximately 123,000 refugees have entered Estonia since the outbreak of the full-scale conflict in Ukraine, of whom approximately 67,000 have remained in the country. The Estonian state provides support through temporary protection registration, which includes the right of residence, to study and work, receive health insurance, financial assistance, and temporary and long-term housing. Considering the population of the country (approximately 1.3 million), the local reception system capacity is overburdened. So far, 41,871 Ukrainians have applied for temporary protection in Estonia, which is almost the same as in Finland, even though Estonia being relatively smaller in terms of size and population<sup>1</sup>.

Since December 2022, Finland and Estonia have been coordinating for interested Ukrainians to move to Finland by group transport to ease the situation of the refugees. The arrangement is scheduled to be launched in January 2023 and will remain in force until further notice. The duration of the arrangement will also be considered from the perspective of the Finnish reception system<sup>2</sup>.

The Estonian Police and Border Guard Board (PPA) initially believed that cold weather and the conflict would increase the flow of refugees. Still, the number of refugees travelling has decreased from approximately 8,000 in October to fewer than 4,000 in November and 3,500 in December 2022<sup>3</sup>. The situation is still uncertain and Needs Assessment and contingency planning are complex due to the fluctuating flows.

### Prioritization: Needs and specific groups that National Societies in country are responding to

The Estonian Red Cross is prioritising on enhance the support to the people from Ukraine on the psychological aid, strengthening services at the Humanitarian Service Points (HSP) and as well as developing the National Society's response units,



### National Society role in the national response

ERC has been working closely with different government actors and national stakeholders in national response framework. Close cooperation with National Insurance Board and Police and Border Control Board has made ERC a trusted partner with its own specific strengths and skills. During the border crisis, ERC was actively involved together with its volunteers to provide support and assistance to the arriving refugees. Furthermore, Tallinn City Council has been a partner for ERC for extended period and are now in the process of signing a MoU for the new CVA program. Also, an agreement was made with Tallinn City Council and ERC's second-hand store to support Ukrainian refugees with the essential items on their arrival to Estonia.

# Key areas of scale-up and strength

The key areas of focus of Estonian Red Cross are providing First Aid courses to the Ukrainian refugees in the government accommodation centres and Ukrainian schools, providing psychological first aid trainings specifically designed for the Ukrainian crisis based on IFRC materials. The trainings are provided to ERC volunteers as well as to the volunteers of other organizations and institutions involved with the Ukrainian crisis and refugees. Furthermore, the Ukrainian children's integrations camps have demonstrated a great success and have revealed a further necessity in providing more psychological support to the children and their parents in order to integrate to the society and feel part of the local community. As the largest number of refugees are based in the capital and surrounding areas, the biggest increase in volume of operation is in the respective area. Additionally, it has become evident, that there is a need for the first aid rapid response teams in all four regions of Estonia to support refugees, especially when arriving to Estonia.

### Areas of new / additional capacities developed

Estonian Red Cross is doing a first time ever CVA program in cooperation with local supermarket by providing social cards to the most vulnerable ones. Developing the capacities in the field of CVA is an important step for ERC to be able to continue these types of activities in the future. Thus, a full training on the topic is seen as a great value-added activity for the National Society. ERC has also developed a psychological first aid training program based on the IFRC approved materials that prepares people to work with the refugees. Additionally, ERC has been taking a stronger role in the national response plan and has developed closer ties with the government institutions responsible of the field.

## **National Society partners**

### Presence of RCRC actors in country

The IFRC Regional Office for Europe in Budapest is coordinating the response operations and provides support to strengthen the capacities of the National Societies of the impacted countries. To ensure support and operational coordination needs, on 14 April 2022, the IFRC deployed an Ops Manager for Baltic Countries to support RCNSs in response and institutional preparedness building. Additionally, the IFRC has established a cluster office in Warsaw to cover six European countries namely Poland, Ukraine, Moldova, Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

Finnish Red Cross is supporting the coordination of the Evacuation Readiness project being implemented by the Estonian Red Cross, along with other Baltic National Societies which is strengthening capacities to operate evacuation centres in coordination with various emergency support services.

### **Movement Cooperation (ICRC)**

ERC restoring family links services are active and collaborating closely with ICRC colleagues. No ICRC permanent presence in country.
