# **EARLY ACTION PROTOCOL ACTIVATION**



### **Activation Overview**

The Yemen Red Crescent Society (YRCS) has activated its simplified early action protocol (sEAP) for Floods.

The second rainy season (summer/monsoon rains) in Yemen started in July 2025 and will continue till September 2025 as per the regular span of the second rainy season in Yemen. With the start of the second rainy season, the rains began across the western and southern governorates of Yemen in July 2025. Since the beginning of this rainy season, the IFRC/YRCS together with the Civil Aviation and Metrology Authority (CAMA)/ Civil Defence in Sana'a has been closely & regularly monitoring the forecast. The ECMWF forecast (18 to 25 Aug 2025) indicated that in Hajjah governorate (Targeted under this sEAP) the rainfall accumulation analysis (18/8/2025 – 25/8/2025), total expected rainfall is 95–120 mm during this period, and from Thursday, 21/8/2025 between 21st Aug to 25th Aug the rainfall accumulation expected: 25–35 mm in 24 hours of window (ECMWF model), YRCS coordinated with CAMA Sana'a and they have confirmed the same, as the actual trigger (24-hour rainfall totals will be 20mm or above across western Yemen (including Hajjah Governorate)) was met, therefore the sEAP was activated on 21st Aug 2025. The early actions under this sEAP will be implemented in two IDP sites Al-Mithaq and Mushta, in the Abs district of Hajjah governorate in Yemen. The early actions timeframe is 7 days, and early actions include flood mitigation activities, cash distribution, distribution of emergency shelter kits, first aid kits, and information dissemination, and will reach more than 15,000 people in the targeted locations.
